Jacque grew up in San Diego, CA; however, she has lived in the Pacific Northwest for almost 35 years. She is married to Roger Smith, an active Bayshore volunteer, and has a daughter who lives in the Metro Area. For much of her career, Jacque was a software engineer. She specialized in writing financial software, which is where her detail-oriented point of view came into play.

About three years ago, Jacque and Roger bought their Bayshore house to serve as a weekend/retirement home. A different picture emerged, though. First, Roger had a very bad fall six weeks after their purchase and spent five months in a wheelchair before being able to walk again. Jacque embraced the challenge of remodeling their home almost solely by herself: ripping out walls and floors, laying all new floors, painting, etc. She also received help from fellow Bayshore members Tom Hurt (replacing some light fixtures) and Tim Brubaker (helping to install kitchen cabinets).

A second curve ball that occurred was when Jacque's job disappeared during the initial impact of COVID. Because of that, she and Roger were in their Bayshore home nearly full time. Given his need for recovery, they opted for early retirement, sold their home in Beaverton, and became full-time Bayshore residents.

Asked what she truly enjoys about the Bayshore community, Jacque responded it is the wonderful people she has come to know in the community and the daily opportunities to connect with nature...right outside her door! On a daily basis, she enjoys watching blue herons, egrets, and eagles (and sometimes the occasional whimsical otters rolling around in the canal). She also loves cuddling, playing with, and walking their two big "bears" (aka Akitas) around the bay. All of these experiences, she stated, have the effect of centering her when the world gets too crazy.

Two unknown facts about Jacque. First, she loves hanggliding. When she was younger, she would jump off the cliff

There have been three meetings since our last Breeze. The minutes from all three meetings are provided below.

Meeting Minutes for November 9, 2021

The meeting was called to order and the minutes from the September 21, 2021 meeting were approved. The October meeting was shifted to November 9 to accommodate board members schedules.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.


OLD BUSINESS

Parker Street update.

It was discussed and decided that all the buttons would be removed from Parker Street and that the pavement would be patched by Road and Driveway by the end of the year. The exact date will be determined by R&D's schedule. Paul made a motion and it was seconded by Tim. The Board voted unanimously to proceed with the project.

Kittleson Engineering

A phone conference has been set up with Kittleson Engineering of Eugene. During this meeting Board





members can ask questions about what we can do to ensure pedestrian safety in Bayshore.

NEW BUSINESS

Paving Projects

It was discussed and decided by the board to seek paving bids on Ocean View and Cedar Crest. Meetings will be set up to seek preliminary measurements and estimates on these future paving projects so that they can be scheduled before the end of the fiscal year (June 2022). Once estimates are received, bid spec sheets will be customized for these specific projects and sent to the respective companies. Paul will contact Road & Driveway and Dennis will contact Knife River to set dates for the meetings.

Vandalism

It was discovered that sometime during the first week of November vandals damaged and stole multiple street signs and a stop sign in Bayshore. The stop sign was replaced immediately, and the street signs will be replaced as soon as new signs can be made. Darrin Goodrick will replace the signs as soon as they become available. Special thanks to two Bayshore residents who found the signs on vacant lots and returned them to the road board. Most of them were damaged and need to be replaced. Others can be used for temporary backup signs. Dennis called and filed a report with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and also sent a letter to the Bayshore Board and property owners to notify them of the situation. We all need to be observant and report any suspicious activity.

Compliance

Tim is investigating a company that specializes in registration renewal. They make sure that our registration with the federal government and FEMA is compliant, and current.

Bills

Tim Submitted a bill for \$135 from SDAO (Special District Association of Oregon). The bill was reviewed and the board voted unanimously to pay the bill.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Parker Street update:

Paul received a response from Road and Driveway. They will remove the buttons on Parker Street and patch the roadway.

NEW BUSINESS

Paul has contacted Road and Driveway and Dennis has contacted Knife River about obtaining preliminary measurements for the paving projects on Ocean View and Cedar Crest (Division 2) roadways. The measurements will be made in December and bid spec sheets sent to each

company. The intent is to have the winning bid scheduled for completion before the end of the fiscal year (June 2022).

Tim presented a work list given to Darrin Goodrick to replace missing/vandalized street signs in Bayshore. It is a work in progress.


Paul set up a conference call with Kittelson Engineering of Eugene. Members of the Road Board were able to ask various questions pertaining to a potential traffic audit, to address pedestrian safety issues in Bayshore. Kittelson was asked to submit a bid on methods to address safety issues. This will involve several different levels of service so that the board can select the one that best fits our particular needs.

Bills:

Tim submitted a bill for \$20 from the Oregon State Audit Division. This was for a filing fee audit for year end June 2021. The bill was reviewed and the Board voted unanimously to pay the bill.

The next meeting is set for December 21, 2021 @ 1 PM in the Bayshore Clubhouse.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned.





PUBLIC COMMENT

TREASURER REPORT

Tim Malone reported that we currently have a balance of \$201,089.67 in the Bayshore Special Road District account.

There is a large capital project, to be scheduled in 2022, that is estimated to cost in excess of \$100,000.

OLD BUSINESS

The speed buttons on Parker have all been removed. The pavement was cut and repaved to match the existing road surface. Road and Driveway of Newport did the work.

Gary from Tri-AG was contacted regarding the sand removal on the South end of Oceania. It is a work in progress.

NEW BUSINESS

The Bayshore Special Road District has received a proposal, from Kittelson Engineering of Eugene, to do a traffic audit in Bayshore. The proposal will be submitted to legal counsel for review prior to acceptance.


Preliminary estimates have been received from Road and Driveway and Knife River for next years (2022) paving project in Division 2. A formal Bid Specification Sheet is being prepared to send to each company for a final bid. When accepted, the work will be scheduled to be done after the end of the fiscal year. (June 30,2022)

It was discussed by the Road Board to have Paul obtain information on new building, in Bayshore, from the Lincoln County Assessor's office. The Board voted unanimously to do so.

Tim Malone submitted 3 bills for payment.

- 1. \$2131.31 from Road and Driveway for the button removal and paving project on Parker St.
- 2. \$43.91 to the State of Oregon Ethics Commission.
- 3. \$379.88 from Lincoln County Public Works for street sign fabrication to replace damaged and vandalized street signs in Bayshore.

The bills were reviewed, and the Road Board voted unanimously to pay them.

The next Road Board meeting is scheduled for January 18, 2022 @ 1PM in the Bayshore Club House.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned.
