Clubhouse renovatioions

Update on Status of Clubhouse Renovation

As many members know, the Board is looking at the idea of renovating the clubhouse. The main impetus for the renovation is because of the Fair Housing Act. Based on guidance from Bayshore's attorney, the Board recognizes that Bayshore has an obligation to reasonably accommodate members with disabilities in their right to access the full use of their community.

In particular, the Board is currently focusing on making the upstairs and downstairs restrooms accessible, which will mean changes to the current restrooms. Other than perhaps minor changes to the office space, the ramp leading up to the second floor, and the ramp from the front parking lot to the sidewalk, the renovation will focus almost solely on the restroom modifications. At this time, the Board has hired an architect to help with the first part of the renovation process.



Clubhouse renovations continued

The architect provided the Board with "as built plans." The architect also presented the Board with modification plans for the downstairs and upstairs restrooms that would allow accessibility for all Bayshore members. Further, an Architectural Specifications Consultant was hired to develop specs based on the architect's modification plan. Once the Board receives those specs, it will determine how and whether it will seek bids from contractors to do the recommended modifications.

The Nature of Bayshore

Facts About Sea Foam

We are all familiar with those bubbly, foamy, white blobs that surf in on waves and grace our beaches from time to time; they are typically called sea foam, ocean foam, beach foam, or spume. But do we really know what they are? I for one, did not, so I decided to do a little research.

To begin with, sea foam is not whale sperm, sewage, pollution or anything else "bad". It is actually an indication of a healthy ecosystem. Basically, sea foam is decomposing organic matter. These little bits of dissolved organic matter are made up of salts, fats, proteins, algae, plankton skeletons, bacteria and more.



It is the proteins in the dead matter that give the water enough surface tension to form bubbles. When the sea is agitated by rain, surf, waves and/or strong winds, air is injected into the dissolved organic matter creating bubbles. The greater the churning, the more foam.

The white beach foam we have is not harmful to humans or pets. So, the next time you are on the beach, and it is dotted with bits of foam, don't be afraid to pick some up and get a close-up view of it. If you like photography, you'll find lots of interesting shapes and textures to keep you busy!


Artisans update

Emergency preparedness

As we all witnessed in the last couple of weeks, there was a series of ice storms that hit the coast pretty hard. It created some situations in which some folks have been without power for more than a week. We DO live in an area in which certain natural disasters and things beyond our control can occur without much warning. Severe sudden weather changes, high winds, exceptionally high tides, earthquakes, flooding, wildfires and even tsunami's can occur. Unfortunately, mother nature can throw these things at us without much warning, and it is always a good thing to be even a little prepared in the event of a situation, where your safety and the safety of your loved ones may be threatened. We will be doing a series of articles that can help you be at least minimally prepared in case of a serious emergency situation. We will be delving deeper into different situations in the coming months.



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Preparedness for home

The Department of Homeland Security's Ready.gov site offers a number of emergency resources, including a list of items that should be in a basic emergency kit. Among those suggested:

- 1 gallon of water per day per person for at least three days.
- At least a three-day supply of nonperishable food.
- A battery-powered or hand-crank radio, along with a NOAA weather radio that sends an automatic tone in case of an emergency alert.
- A flashlight and extra batteries. (all sizes. You never know what will be needed).
- A cellphone with chargers and a backup battery (if your battery can be changed).
- A whistle to signal for help.
- A basic first aid kit
- 3 to 7 day supply of medication





Preparedness Continued

BASIC Disaster planning per the CDC for Older Americans

For more information on what to do to prepare for an emergency, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has a <u>list of information</u> created specifically for older Americans. Among the items the agency recommends you have on hand:

- 1) A minimum three-day supply of medications, along with a cooler and ice packs if your medications require refrigeration. Also, if needed, medical supplies such as syringes.
- 2) Contact lens solution, glasses and/or hearing aids and extra batteries for people who need them.
- 3)An identification band with your full name, a list of any allergies and a family-member contact number.
- 4) Information about your medical devices, including oxygen, walkers and wheelchairs. The information should include model numbers and the vendor of the products.
- 5) Documents in a waterproof bag. They should include a personal care plan; contact information for family members; a medication list including the dosage, exact name, pharmacy information and the prescribing doctor for each medication; a list of food or medical allergies; copies of photo IDs and medical insurance cards; and durable power of attorney and/or medical power of attorney documents.
- 6) Cash to be used if automatic teller and credit card machines are not working.



BEACH ACCESS

Please only use designated public beach accesses marked with signs to get to the beach.

• QUIET TIME

The hours of 10pm to 7 am are required quiet time per Bayshore and Lincoln County ordinance.

• RV Parking

No RVs may be parked on Bayshore properties or along the roadside without previous permission of the planning committee & within limitations set forth.


• PARKING

Please Park in the garage or driveway. The roads are narrow, and vision can be obstructed by vehicles along the road. SPEED LIMIT IS 25MPH.

• PETS

Per Bayshore C&R's and Oregon law you must keep your pets confined to your yard or on a leash. Also, you must clean up after them.

• SAFETY

The ocean can be very dangerous. Please watch your children very carefully. Seals and seal pups, snowy plovers and other marine animals are protected species. Keep at least 200 feet away and keep your pets from running up on them. Federal law prohibits touching, feeding or disturbing marine mammals.

 $\mathcal{F}I\mathcal{R}\mathcal{E}$

Fire is a very real danger. Fireworks are NOT allowed in Bayshore or on the beach and are a serious hazard during dry weather. OAR 736.021.0100 prohibits "possessing, discharging or causing to be discharged any firecracker, explosion, torpedoes, rockets, fireworks or other similar devices" on Oregon beaches. Beach fires are ONLY permitted on open sand west of the dunes and cannot be started in areas of built-up driftwood.

- Lots must be kept clean and in visually pleasing condition. Keep weeds, cleared and trimmed trees within the C&R limits. Garbage and other waste shall be placed in sanitary containers with lids and removed weekly. Garbage cans stored near the street must be screened from the view.
- Be kind to your neighbors.
