For those of you have been following the progress of the Mobi-Mat project, it is now officially completed. Wahoo!! That completion included putting down gravel starting at the street and going to the beginning of the first mat. That process included digging out an approximate 7x5 foot space, laying down tarp, and then placing the gravel on top of the prepared space. Like everything else with this project, Bayshore did not provide any funds for the work and gravel. Darrin Goodrick, a man known throughout Bayshore for his work on many members' yards, footed the entire bill. Thank you, Darrin. Also, last month I was amiss in not mentioning Craig Jacobs, who did the entire prep for

mapping out/drawing the boundaries of Beach Access 66C, which enabled us to move smoothly through the permit process and helped when we also asked a professional surveyor to survey the pathway. Thanks, Craig.



To mark that the mats were now fully functional and ready for all to use, a ribbon cutting ceremony was held on May 24<sup>th</sup>. All members were invited to attend and particularly those whose donations made the project a success. Bernie and Craig Williams, major donors and also members of the Mobi-Mat (cleaning) Team, were asked to cut the ribbon. All in all, it was a great way to finalize an important project that means a great deal to so many individuals.






### A Bird's Eye View by Staci Louie

#### "Study nature, love nature, stay close to nature. It will never fail you." Frank Lloyd Wright

First off, let me introduce myself. My name is Staci and my husband Ben and I bought our house in Bayshore a year ago. When were looking for a house along the coast, I quickly decided Bayshore was where we belonged. I loved its beautiful beach, walkable neighborhood, quiet lowkey vibe, and friendly residents who always wave as they pass by. You will often see me walking around the neighborhood with my dogs, carrying a messenger bag with one of my favorite things- my camera. I started taking pictures a few years ago after getting a used camera. I would take pictures of the mountains, trees, flowers, but it wasn't until I started taking pictures of birds that I found my new love. I have since upgraded to a better camera (Nikon D7500) that can keep up with my obsession. Want to see my eyes glaze over? Start asking me about aperture, ISO settings, or any other technical term related to cameras. Not interested. I want my camera to do all the work for me, so point and shoot is my game. Want to see my face light up with happiness? Ask me about birds. So if you are interested in birds, I will be writing an article every month about a different bird you will find along the Oregon coast. I'm certainly not an expert, but I learn more with each and every bird I encounter. Hopefully these articles will enhance your appreciation for the beautiful creatures that share this world with us.

Interested in learning more about the birds you see around you? Download the Merlin app to your phone. It gives you a list of birds most likely to be seen in your area and can identify them by photos or sounds. More old-school? Try a Sibley or Peterson's guide.

### White-crowned Sparrow

Hear that lovely song? Look around you. This sparrow (mostly the males) loves to sing and will often do so from the tops of bushes and trees, so that the bird can be seen and heard. The White-crowned sparrow is an adorable little bird with the adults showing white and black stripes on their head (both males and females) while immature birds have brown and tan stripes. White-crowned Sparrows are one of the most common sparrows in North America.




They are ground feeders, so if they are not up high serenading the neighborhood, they can be found foraging for bugs, seeds and grains in grasses and under feeders.

There are also Golden-crowned Sparrows with, you guessed it, a gold or yellow head rather than white.

# Bayshore's Past: Selling Out Bayshore

That may not seem like an attractive heading for a story on Bayshore. But, that's exactly what the developers of Bayshore were trying to do in 1964. And boy did they have the market plan to do so!



I came across the sales brochure for Bayshore dated 1964 (see photo to the left). As you can see in the pictures accompanying this article, Bayshore was quite novel and primed to sell lots. As you can see on the cover, there were not many lots sold yet. In fact, there doesn't appear to be any lots built with a house; however, as you can see, the clubhouse was up and running. The inside of the sales brochure was the following advice: "Bayshore is truly different. It's designed to provide you with your own place on the Coast for years to come. Oregon's bustling economy means expansion, more jobs, more people. And less available land for recreational and retirement use. Look ahead ten years. Will Oregon double, perhaps triple its population and industry in that time? Will there be any land left on the Coast in 1974?"

Well, the brochure was a tad off; Oregon increased its population by approximately 21% from 1964 to 1974. It does, though, explain the reason for the preponderance of gray hair here. <sup>(2)</sup> Those points aside, the brochure certainly made Bayshore look attractive. For example, check out the picture below of the folks sitting around the pool. I mean, that definitely looks like the members who sit around the pool today, right?



Speaking of the pool, both inside the brochure and on the back of that document (see photo to the right), the developers highlighted what new members would receive: the "finest" Oregon had to offer. These included the owner's club, including the ballroom and the pool (see pictures from the back of the brochure to the right). The inside of the clubhouse and the pool don't look that different from today.

Both inside the brochure and its back, you can see members also had their own private beach. That was until July 6<sup>th</sup> of 1967, when Oregon Governor Tom McCall signed into law that all beaches would be publicly accessible and the right to access Oregon's coastline was guaranteed.

Further, the brochure boasts about Bayshore's private canal and lake. In these pictures, the canal looks more like a sandy beach than the current canal. And Mokmac Lake is shown as a place to fish and even have small rowboats and sailboats. Interestingly, it is not completely clear whether Bayshore still owns that lake. When one looks at publicly-available county records, results suggest that the lake may be a publicly owned lake (by Oregon) property or perhaps a combination of public and private ownership. Nevertheless, the pictures of the lake and its use don't match how the lake is used today.



All in all, I think the original developers of Bayshore would be quite pleased with the number of lots bought and (for most) built on. How fascinating to have records of Bayshore's beginning and then be able to compare those "fine features" with our current Bayshore Beach Club.
